The Boy in the Striped Pajamas was written by an Irish Novelist, John Boyne and it was published on 5th January, 2006.

The Clay Marble Book Review

The book is about the story of a young girl and her family, innocent civilians caught up in a war being fought between that dictatorship and outside governments trying to remove it from power. A young Cambodian girl named Dara and her family travel to the Nung Chan refugee camp, where they plan to find safety from the war raging around them. When they arrive at the camp, the family makes its way to one of the few open spaces left, where they set up camp next to another refugee family-friendly teenaged Nea, solemn Grandpa Kem, Nea's outspoken cousin Jantu and Jantu's baby brother. The two families join forces to make as good a life as they can in the camp. Jantu and Dara in particular become close friends. Meanwhile, Nea and Sarun experience a romantic attraction to each other. Eventually, the war comes too close, and the camp becomes dangerous. A bomb falls and Dara and Jantu are separated from their families. Dara tries to catch up with the convoy, but is unable to. She then returns to the refugee camp. There she finds the bully Chnay, who tells her her family had been there and had been waiting for her but had moved on. Dara relies on the magic clay marble for help and courage. Dara, with what she believes is the help of the marble, manipulates her way into working for the camp cook, and eventually reunites with both families. On their way back, they got shot. Jantu is fatally wounded and, with Dara at her side, dies the next day, but not before telling Dara that the marble in fact had no magic.

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Dara is a 12-year-old girl who grows up in a war-torn Cambodia during the 1980's. Her mother, brother (Sarun), and she are forced to move from their own town to the border of Cambodia and Thailand to settle at a refugee camp. Fighting between several factions in Cambodia, communist rule, and Vietnamese invasions cause many Cambodian citizens to relocate to this safer ground.

At the refugee camp, Dara meets a girl around her age – Jantu. The two girls form a close relationship and learn that “playing with dolls” is the best way for them to take their minds off the violence in their country as well as the loss of some members of their families. As Dara and Jantu become closer, they come to view each other as “family members”. The view of family is a major theme in this novel.

Many families in Cambodia are displaced during this time, however the bonds of humanity bring together people in the most desperate of times. Around this time in the story, Jantu gives Dara a clay marble for support and encouragement during this stressful period.

Book Review: The Clay Marble

I have just read this realistic, emotional novel by Minfong Ho. The themes of this book would be the consequences of war on people, family or home, friendship, bravery, and a simple life.

Dara, the protagonist, has become a refugee at the Cambodia-Thai border with her mother and older brother, Sarun. Families at the refugee camp are all torn apart, missing at least one family member who has tragically been killed by the soldiers or has been lost on the way to the border, but these scattered groups of families become closer, like Dara's and Nea's. At first, everything seems to be going well when Dara and her family arrived at the border and made good friends with Nea, her cousins, Jantu and Baby, and Grandpa Kem. The excitement starts when an intense war broke out at the border. The family is separated while running away from the camp, and Dara has to find her way back to her family alone, keeping the clay marble that Jantu has made for her. She thinks that the marble's magical, and that it gives her courage. She meets Chnay, who helps Dara find her family while Dara was working as a cook's helper at a base camp. At this point, the reader might feel tense and unsure, or even hopeless that Dara might not find her family back again. This part of the book made me feel that Dara was already abandoned, lost and hopeless. Dara will not give up on the search and with much luck, finds her family again. The most tragic part is when Jantu, Dara's best friend, gets shot by Sarun's companion soldier. Jantu is a wise, realistic one, who is also good at making all sorts of toys from scrap and mud, but unfortunately, she died from the wound of the gunshot. It is hard to say if it has a tragic or a happy ending, but it sure has lots of heartbreaking parts. I guess it has a happy ending as the two families lived a peaceful life back home, and Dara finally realizes that it was not the clay marble that gave her courage, but that the courage came from within her.

It's a splendid read which has been carefully written that it makes the reader feel as if he/she were the characters. It reminds me of home, family, and even a thought that war has negative impacts on innocent people and has separated families. The reader might even cry at some tragic points of the book.

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Drawing on her experience with a relief organization on the Thai border, Ho tells the story of a Cambodian family, fleeing the rival factions of the 80's while hoping to gather resources to return to farming in their homeland. Narrator Dara, 12, and the remnants of her family have arrived at a refugee camp soon after her father's summary execution. At first, the camp is a haven: food is plentiful, seed rice is available, and they form a bond with another family- -brother Sarun falls in love with Nea, and Dara makes friends with Nea's cousin, Jantu, who contrives marvelous toys from mud and bits of scrap; made wise by adversity, Jantu understands that the process of creation outweighs the value of things, and that dead loved ones may live on in memory. The respite is brief: Vietnamese bombing disrupts the camp, and the family is temporarily but terrifyingly separated. Later, Jantu is wounded by friendly fire and doesn't survive; but her tragic death empowers Dara to confront Sarun, who's caught up in mindless militarism instigated by a charismatic leader, and persuade him to travel home with the others—to plant rice and build a family instead of waging war. Again, Ho (*Rice Without Rain*, 1990) skillfully shapes her story to dramatize political and humanitarian issues.

When they arrived at the camp the family makes its way to one of the few open spaces left where they set up camp next to another refugee family. A friendly teenage near solemn grandpa Kam Nia's outspoken cousin John - who is about Dara's age and John whose baby brother. After some initially tentative conversation the two families joined forces to make as good a life as they can in the camp. Eventually, the war comes **to close and the camp becomes dangerous.** The two families joined a long convoy of departing refugees in hurry as fast as they can out of harm's way when a bomb falls near the convoy causing Dhara and John to be separated from their families and then from each other when John too has to ride with her injured brother in an ambulance. the frantically worried Dhara doesn't want to leave her but John who says she has to go find her family and quickly fashions another clay marble which she says is also magic and will help Dhara along her way after John who leaves Dhara tries to catch up with the convoy but is unable to she then returns to the refugee camp in the hopes that her the family would be waiting for her there she finds the bullies Shinae who tells her family had been there and had been waiting for her but had moved on when Dhara resolves to follow them Shinae joins her and the two eventually make their way to the makeshift base camp for soldiers in the rebel army the The whole time Dhara relies on the magic clay marble for help and courage Dhara with that she believes is the help of the marble manipulates her way into working for the camp cook and eventually reunites with both families Sauron is now a soldier and determined to make good on his new career Dhara meanwhile is determined to retrieve John - and her brother from the hospital and returned them home when both families can resume their quiet farm life eventually after bullying Suren into helping her Dhara accompanied by Nia makes the journey to the hospital where she finds John – and her baby brother more than ready to leave on the way back however a group of centuries including sovereign mistakes them for enemies and shoots them john ii is fatally wounded and with Daraa at her side from she dies the next day but not before telling Dara that the Marble is not magic all the strength dar felt all the opportunities she encountered were the result not of the marble but her courage following John twos death the angry grieving dark then bullies are ending the agreeing to make the trip home with them in an epilogue the 10 years older Donna narrates how she and both families made their way home settled and prospered she also describes her intention to help her own daughter learn courage the way she did with the help of a magic marble where's the funny hey does he eat the clay marble Konami.

The Clay Marble is a scarily relevant book that takes place during the Cambodian war. The book itself centers on our protagonist Dara going away with her family during the war to find a safer place to stay, during this they meet another family one of the members of which happens to be a girl named Junta who teaches her how to make clay toys and makes her a 'magic' clay marble.

The war eventually ends and both Dara and Junta are separated from their families due to a bomb. A lot of stuff happens that they have to go through and Junta ends up dying from a bullet wound after telling Dara about how the marble wasn't really magic but that it was her strength that kept her going.

This is a really good book and one that I think is quite important in this time. It tells the story of how persistence and strength can be the most important asset in times of need.

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I would like to review an interesting book called The Clay Marble. Even though it is fictional, it is a good book as it includes specific details and chronological order. Most importantly, there is an important message which is to never give up and be who you are no matter what the others tell or think of you.

The Clay Marble is a 1991 children's novel by Minfong Ho. It is set in war-torn Cambodia after the fall of the Khmer Rouge in the early 1980s. It is about a girl named Dara and her friend Jantu, and illustrates the struggles they face. In fact, it also shows how brave a girl can be and all the effects and sufferings of the war and how these girls were able to overcome.

12-year-old Dara, her older brother Sarun, and their mother went on a journey to the Thai border in search of rations. Here they meet the remnants of another Cambodian family, one of whose members, Jantu, becomes Dara's friend; another, Nea, falls in love with Sarun. Life is going along well until in fighting among neighboring guerrilla groups forces the families to flee again. In the confusion, Dara and Jantu become separated from the main group. After many incidents, they are reunited with their families, although Jantu is shot in the process and dies soon after.

Sarun, once a proud farmer, decides to join the military. Dara bravely stands up to him, and convinces him to return home with the family. The title comes from Jantu's effervescence and manual dexterity, the combination of which impresses Dara as magic. She believes a clay marble, having been invested with Jantu's magic, gives her the courage to get through her ordeals. She wishes for luck and more from the marble, only to find out the magic is within herself.

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Farmer Hogget guessed the weight of a piglet at a fair and took him home. The piglet, Babe was now living on Hogget's sheep farm and found himself in a big box next to Fly and the young sheep-dogs. Fly adopted Babe and she soon started teaching and training Babe about the farm and how they protect the dogs. Babe was a determined pig, and he eventually became a sheep-pig. He learnt the trade of sheep herding through a number of dramatic turns, and overcame the shame of being a dumb pig or, worse, a Christmas meal.

This book gives us an idea of how a lonely and sad pig manages to be useful and adapt wherever he is. Babe is a brave and a determined one. He's definitely gifted, has the nerves of steel and the heart of gold. Babe the sheep-pig honors the integrity and nature of animals. The whole book is set from their viewpoint. You will love all of these animals and even the good-humored mice who announce various chapter heads in the life action movie, which was produced in 1995.

Babe the Sheep-pig shows how certain such expectations can change across the timeline; stereotypes can change. With the aid of his new sheepdog mom, Babe was able to resolve current dogma directly linked to her specious dog. It's a great example when a loving spirit and intellect allows a piglet to be valued as a member of animal society. With its reverence for the ideals of self-esteem, passion, empathy, Babe is a small moral masterpiece.

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The Clay Marble Book Review

Fleeting from Cambodia, Dara and her mother and her brother finds a refugee camp on the Border of Thailand. At first, the camp is wonderful. Plenty of food and other resources. Dara makes friends with Jantu, who has an almost magical touch in creating toys from mud. However, the Vietnamese destroyed the camp and separated the family temporarily. Unfortunately, Jantu died of friendly fire. Jantu makes a magic marble out of clay that helps Dara track down her family and then return to the hospital for Jantu and her brother. The book expresses about war, loss and friendship. Although the book is towards children, it expresses a mature image, describing the struggle of war refugees. The writer intends to express the result of war for the future generations. War is a struggle and doesn't benefit the both sides. After all, innocent people die in the battlefield. The book tells us the struggle in war. The soldiers who are commanded to fight. Peace could be made through a treaty not by killing the other side!

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BLACK BOY details the formative years of Richard Wright, a best-selling author and activist who grew up during the 1920s in Mississippi and Tennessee. The book reveals the extreme emotional and physical depravation of Wright's childhood -- hunger and the threat of violence were Wright's most constant companions. After his father abandons the family, Richard, his mother, and his brother move from town to town, in and out of relatives' homes, in a constant struggle to survive. Richard wants to be educated, but never knows year to year whether he will be able to enroll in school -- because he can't afford the books he needs, hasn't proper clothing, or has to care for his ailing mother. Yet, somehow Wright managed to retain some semblance of self esteem, and a keen awareness of the injustice of racial prejudice. Writing from an adult perspective, he shows clearly the desperation born of bigotry and brutality, and the ways that learning and ideas helped to liberate him.

Jack The Ripper

And what would you do if it all came crumbling, down, down, and down?

And what if you seemingly came back?

Yasobi's song, *Gunjou*, is seemingly about this tragedy, as we follow the story of the narrator and their downfall, and return to sense.

Note: Although it is true that this song is made for *Blue Period*, I am not going to consider it within the context of the series. I shall be considering what the song has to convey from the *lyrics* itself. However, I'll be using the story of the Dancer from the official MV as a reference and apply its message to make a plot that matches with the lyrics and the motivations of the original protagonist. Anyway, let's begin.

"Ah, just like usual,
I yawn in the days that pass.
Overcoming the vibrant loud nights,
Mourning falls on the streets of Shibuya."

The song starts as the singer, Narrator, wakes up from the last night sleep. "Overcoming the vibrant loud nights" suggests that the Narrator probably had trouble sleeping. Traffic and noise pollution are main causes of Insomnia, and both are rampant in housing areas where living expenses are cheaply affordable. We can derive the fact that the Narrator is not doing financially well, and that it's impacting them negatively from these hints.

"That kind of feeling
Like it's empty somewhere
It sure is boring
But that is fine
That's how it is
This is fine"

The Narrator feels 'empty', and is bored. However, they think they are ok, that they are fine. This tells us that whatever is the reason for this state, it's important enough for the Narrator to lie to themselves for. Something that they would discard and ignore their own feelings for.

"Drawing based on how I felt it
In that color I chose myself
In the morning surrounded by a sleepy atmosphere
The blue sky I visited
To say that I like the things I like
It is scary and I can't help it
But, I felt that
I had met my true self"

And here, we learn what it was: Painting. The Narrator uses 'the blue sky' as a metaphor for their hobby. They draw as they see fit (first line) with the colors which they see fit (second line). We also learn that the Narrator keeps this a secret, that they are scared to confess about their hobby. But when they do it, the emptiness described in the verse before had gone, and they finally feel full.

"Ah. the further I reach out
The further it goes
Today doesn't go as planned either
I am still struggling frantically
Even the feelings of regret and frustration
Are just pathetic and tears come out"
"The deeper I step into it
The more agonizing it is
It even becomes painful
Moving forwards based on how I felt it
On this path I chose by myself
In the night when I rub my heavy eyelids
The blue oath I held onto
To continue what I like
It's not only 'fun'
Can I really do it?
I feel anxious about it though"

It is truly there even now
Your true voice that hid before you knew it
Let it resonate, now
Even if you pretend that you can't see it
It is truly there, within you"

The final verse is a double message. On one hand, it's the artist's final encouragement on themselves. To let their voice out fully and to embrace it. They finally convinced themselves that, even if it's not there, it is there: Hope. Even if it may seem like it isn't anywhere to be found, or if they pretend to not see it in a midst of despair, Hope still exists. They finally shacked their locks of despair, and allowed their voice to resonate. And this message, should also go to you. In these hard times, Hope cannot be rarer. But remember the story of the lonely painter, who turned their life around. Remember that at the end of the day, only those that can embrace the things they love and can dedicate their lives to them will ever be happy.

But what happened to the Narrator? Were they successful? Well, I cannot tell you. At the end of the day, such ending was never provided, so you can insert your own. Furthermore, this is my idea of what this song is about, and it could very well be simply for *Blue Period*, or the sad Dancer who danced as her world, and everyone else's, ends.

However, the more they indulge in their hobby, the more pained they become. They start to doubt themselves, whether their drawings were as good as they planned (third line), and regret and frustrations fuel them until they break into tears. The second verse extends on this, further explaining to us the pain and despair of the Narrator. However, they still continue as they see fit (4th line), even when exhausted and tired (6th line). They still want to keep their 'blue oath', their dream. Doubt fills their mind, however, and they start to get anxious.

"No matter how many drawings I drew
Hey, no matter how many drawings I drew
It's because I don't have confidence that I drew them
No matter how many times
Hey, no matter how many times
The things I have built up will become weapons
To say I've looked around
To say I have compared with someone
What is the thing that only I can do
Even now I don't have something like confidence"

Here, we learn their main gripes. No matter how much the Narrator draws, they are not confident in themselves. The reason why they draw so much, is that it's because they are not yet satisfied with what they had made. The second part is the most interesting however.

The Narrator calls their works weapons. And after much thought, I know what it means. They are weapons against the Narrator themselves, the main thing that hurts and abuses them. The Narrator believes no matter how much inspiration they get, it's no use. They start to compare themselves with other artists, wondering what their niche was. What was the thing that they could only do? But they weren't able to answer their own question, not having enough confidence for it

"But even so
The feelings I have never felt before
The thoughts that exists without me knowing
Step out onto that day
The light that is still small which I touched it,
By facing this pain that I felt for the first time and all of it
With the things I like
It's fine, let's go, all that's left is to enjoy it"

The Narrator finally comes to their senses and remembers why they started painting. It was, and still is, their dream. They experienced "feelings they never felt before", and "thoughts that exists without them knowing", and they fully grasped onto them. They were their original thoughts and feelings on painting. The old Narrator, who painted without worry and enjoyed it to the fullest. One with confidence and endeavor. Such memory was now only such a small light, but the Narrator clung onto it, restoring their own hope. They realized that they are used to this pain, and finally breaks through, ignoring everything to only enjoy painting, for the first time in forever.

"Drawing while putting everything on the line
In the color that only I can come up with
I continue to run through the morning and night
The blue light I finally found
To face it with the things I like
It's scary now
But, I am no longer the invisible me of that day
Just as I really am
This is the irreplaceable me"

They fully devoted themselves to drawing now, giving up everything else for it. The Narrator found a niche, their style, and devoted themselves to their arts. They continue through the days and nights, and are finally "facing the blue light with the things I like". I find this to be a metaphor for how they finally decided to put their arts on display and take the first leap. The blue lights refer to the spotlights of a museum shining onto their paintings, which are the things they like. They say that it's scary, but comments on how they are no longer an invisible, unknown artist without confidence, but had become one with such unique style, that they are unreplaceable. That they truly believed they were among the best.

"Your true voice that hid before you knew it
